EXPLICACIÓN PAST PERFECT

El tiempo verbal **past perfect** se utiliza principalmente para expresar acciones que ocurrieron con anterioridad a otras que tuvieron lugar en el pasado. Expresa el pasado del pasado. Ejemplo→ **When *arrived, everyone had left.* (cuando llegue, ya todos se habían ido.)**

El pasado perfecto está compuesto por dos partes: el pasado del verbo to have que es **had** + el past participle del verbo principal.

En oraciones afirmativas, usamos **had** + el **pasado participio** → ***We had been there before.***

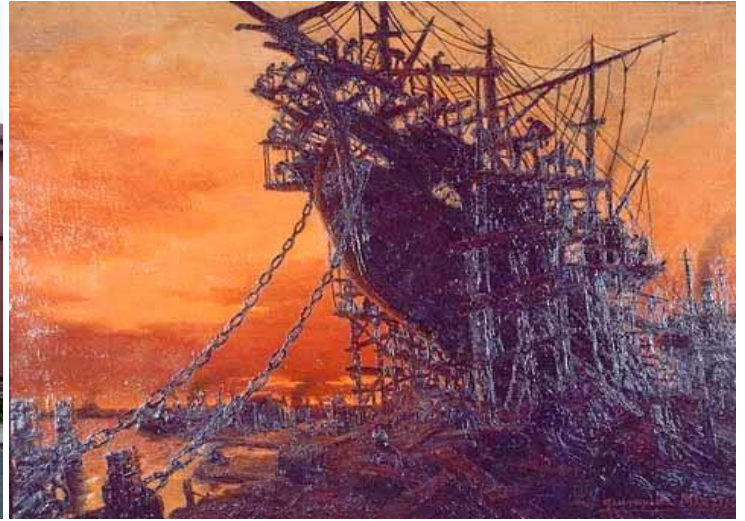
En oraciones negativas, usamos **hadn't** + el **pasado participio**→ ***When I got into the exam, I realised I hadn't studied enough.***

En oraciones interrogativas, usamos **had** + el **sujeto**+ el **pasado participio** → ***Had you ever met Julia before the party last week?***

“A robbery at “Museo de Bellas Artes”
